

Act now to save semi-open primaries

LD 231, the semi-open primaries bill that passed with significant bipartisan support, remains on the special appropriations table with just a few days left in this session.

We cannot leave anything to chance. Please email Senate President Troy Jackson, Senator Cathy Breen, Senate Chair of the Appropriations and Financial Affairs Committee, and Senator Donna Bailey, who also sits on the AFA Committee and ask these Senators to take L.D. 231 off of the special appropriations table.

80% of Maine voters support semi-open primaries and bringing our election law in line with our shared values of civic engagement. It is time for this common sense legislation to be enacted, now.

If you want to see L.D. 231 enacted, please email these Senators RIGHT NOW and ask them to take L.D. 231 off of the special appropriations table.

We're so close, but we aren't there yet and we cannot leave anything to chance.

LD 1779 (Election Security) was signed by the governor on March 31. The bill clarifies the ability for clerks to get into nursing homes and tribal IDs can be used as ID.

Semi-open primaries is still in appropriations; ranked-choice-voting at the municipal level signed by governor last Tuesday.

LD 1155 (An Act to Require Election Transparency and Audits) is at appropriations and LWV says it's a hard price tag to make happen.


The Maine House of Representatives talked for at least an hour trying to squash **PFAS bill 1911**, but it passed through the house 81-52, now back in Senate. Also, **LD 2013 PFAS** went straight to appropriations. Passed through committee unanimously, and now through house.

LD 1954 and 1636 (Access to prescription contraceptives) passed.

LD 1909 (An Act to Remove Restrictions on Syringe Service Programs) already signed. Gun safety bill also signed.

Over 200 people attended a big rally today at state house for clear drinking water at Sipayik. Governor Mills stated she will veto this bill.

UUtheVote2022: Job descriptions are underway. UU the Vote is non-partisan and conversations are with a range of folks. Updates coming - looking for a leader to help facilitate this work.
