Join Erika as she reviews the history of Hell, and reflects on about the hells we create.

Post-Worship, October 1: UU History in 15 Minutes

Our monthly theme for October is "UU Roots." Do you wish you knew more about our UU roots? Following worship, Erika will provide a whirlwind summary of our Unitarian, Universalist, and Unitarian Universalist histories. She'll then lead a brief discussion and answer questions. (Total time: 45 minutes) All are welcome!

Oct. 8: Celebrating Our UU Ancestors, led by John Adams and the Fellowship's Worship Associates. In this worship service, we'll reflect on some of our Unitarian and Universalist forebears from centuries past.

Oct. 15: Celebrating Our Fellowship led by Bob Whitmire and the Midcoast UU Board members. This year, our congregation is celebrating its 35th Anniversary! Today your Board members will offer reflections about their own spiritual lives, prompting reflection about our congregation's past, present, and future.

Oct. 22: Skeletons in Our Closet by **Rev. Erika Hewitt.** Although our religious tradition is strong, proud, and glorious, our Unitarian Universalist history includes shadows of shame and sin. This morning Rev. Erika will pull back the curtain to expose some of those skeletons. How will we choose to move forward as a faith? Our **SHARE THE PLATE** offering will be given to support Black Lives of Unitarian Universalism.

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Minister's Column



When I was a little girl, my family lived in Cuernavaca, México. It probably wasn't much fun for my parents to navigate a new culture and a foreign language with a 7-year old (me) and a 3-year old (my brother) in tow. but it was a year of adventure — and a planting of vivid mem-

ories. (I believe this childhood experience is why I later studied Spanish, lived in several Latin American countries, and earned a Master's in Latin American studies... but that's another story.)

One of my most powerful experiences during our time in México was taking part in Day of the Dead — or *Día de los muertos* — a festive celebration of those who have died held on November 2, which correlates to All Souls Day.



Even as a second grader, my existential streak ran deep: I responded on a visceral level to the altars laden with candles and photos, skulls and marigolds. Those experiences helped me understand that the living and the dead might be separated by less than we think; that our mourning can contain laughter; that making a spectacle of death and remembrance is more honorable than silent grief.

Although I returned to México many times, in adolescence and as an adult, I never got to experience another Día de los meurtos.... until this year.

Many of you know that just over a year ago, I completed treatment for breast cancer. It took me a while

to grieve, to take stock, and to confront the reality that I won't be Earthside forever. I had to ask myself: How can I live more fully? What — if left undone — will haunt me for having neglected? One of the many answers that came back was: experience Día de los meurtos in México.

All of this is to say that **between Oct. 29th and Nov. 5th, I'll be in México City** (yes, despite recent earthquakes) on what you might call a pilgrimage. I'm returning to a place and a celebration that my 7-year old self found holy, combing it for new meaning, and relishing a chance to immerse myself in a new culture.

While I'm away, I won't be available by phone or email — but I hope to return to you renewed and reinspired by having turned this "someday" item into reality.



of the UU Community Church of Augusta.



2018 Share the Plate Nominations Welcome Now

Our Fellowship takes pride in dedicating the financial donations collected during one worship service each month to a designated local non-profit organization. 2018 Nominations are now being accepted during the month of October. Clip boards will be available after each October service and all members of the Fellowship are eligible to nominate organizations that meet the following criteria: Non-profit organizations with a Social Justice mission serving the Lincoln County community.

The commonly held definition of social justice is the fair and just relation between the individual and society. in the current global grassroots movements for social justice, the emphasis has been on the breaking of barriers for social mobility, the creation of safety nets, and economic justice, including a requirement to serve Lincoln County enables the Fellowship to strengthen ties to local organizations. In addition, there will be two open slots the Board can choose for organizations that may have a broader reach.

Once nominations close on October 29th, the Fellowship's Social Justice Committee will review the nominations for eligibility criteria and diversity and recommend 10 organizations for the Board to approve and announce at the November 13th Annual Meeting. Please remember to sign the nomination form for each organization you nominate so a member of the Social Justice Committee can contact you in case more information is needed.
