If you were at worship on June 16th, you experienced the pastoral and loving presence of Lisa Kynvi, a UU seminarian who lives outside of Boston. Lisa was a stu-

dent of mine when I taught

two graduate courses this spring at Starr King School for the Ministry — the seminary from which I graduated, too. I was impressed by Lisa's wisdom, maturity, and playful spirit, so I asked Lisa if she would come preach for us.

This is where things get magical: Lisa mentioned that she's "wired for possibility"—which also describes me to a T-and asked more about our vibrant, small, thriving congregation. Could she come preach, Lisa asked, but also come visit us more, so that as part of her ministerial formation she could learn what it's like to serve a healthy UU congregation? (What do you think I said?)

Everyone who's spoken to me about Lisa's worship service has offered their praise for her. For her part, Lisa fell in love with us, too. Your Board of Trustees and I are now talking with Lisa about making her a recurring part of our Fellowship's leadership when I go on sabbatical from February 1st through April 30th, 2020. What's more, we're exploring ways to enter into a learning agreement with her so that Lisa can join us as a half-time Intern Minister in the fall of 2020, and serve us through the spring of 2022.

That's big news, isn't it? And none of it is written is stone; all of it is still in formation. Your Board and I will soon come to you with our vision, and with an explanation of how this internship would work, and be funded (spoiler: we think it will be easier than you might think).


Thursday, July 11th, 9:30 a.m. at LaVerna Preserve, Bristol

This is 2.5 mile, moderate (not gentle) hike leads to the ocean shoreline through mixed forest.

Take Route 32 south from Round Pond. Go 3.5 miles south of the Round Pond Post Office. Notice Ocean Hill cemetery on your right. Soon after the cemetery, there's a parking area for the preserve on the right (west side of road).

Monday, July 15th, 6:30 p.m. at Dodge Point, Newcastle

We'll take an easy-to-moderate hike through mixed growth forest, perhaps resting at the pebble beach that's filled with evidence of 18th- and 19th-century brick making operations.

MUUF Immigrant Justice Initiative

Since our initial meetings of this small MUUF group in early

Sandy Barth Spring, we have been looking for ways to broaden our approach. With no significant efforts in our local area, we attended meetings of the Midcoast New Mainers Support Group in the Bath/Brunswick area. While they welcomed our assistance, they are overwhelmed with helping two families in the Bath area and don't have any current plans for settling more families primarily due to the housing shortage.

Then in mid-June the sudden influx of asylum seekers to Portland caught everyone by surprise but also unleashed a torrent of support and interest both in the local area and throughout the state. On June 20th, a spontaneous local ecumenical effort led by Rev. Char Corbett came together with an initial Community Meeting at the Second Congregational Church, Newcastle. Several members of our MUUF congregation attended including Sandy Barth, Nancy Slobodnik, Jill Linzee, Patti Anderson, Julia Fitz-Randolph, Sarah Wolcott and Andrew Twaddle, Deb Arter, and Lindy Gifford. Fourteen churches and several ecumenical and advocacy groups were represented. There was a lot of sharing of information and interests. A follow-up meeting has been scheduled for July 11th at 2 pm at the Second Congregational Church. We will keep you updated on the results of that meeting.

Concert to Help Asylum Seekers in Maine

Sunday, July 14 7:00 p.m.

Sponsored by the Mission Committee of the Church.

All donations will be given to ILAP, Maine's Immigrant Legal Advocacy Project, for legal support to and representation of asylum seekers and refugees.

Originally from Saint Louis Missouri, John was influenced early on by that town's rhythm and blues and his Oklahoma mother's singing. It was during this time, he realized, that his audience could not understand Latin. Winner of both the 2003 Boston Folk Festival Songwriting Contest and the 2006 Rose Garden Coffeehouse Song Contest, John has also been a finalist in many other song contests. His CD Memory Train was CD of the Week on Chicago's WFMT's Midnight Special. His new CD is Two-Step Man. John lives in Boothbay Harbor, ME with his wife, Jane and fat cat, Iko.

Talking Tree Earth Conversations:

Talking Tree is a safe place that offers authentic conversation about our global climate emergency. It makes

possible deep thought and

meaningful reflection. Talking Tree intends to stimulate growth in our consciousness of the Earth and in our relationships to its ecological crisis.

Provocative conversation topics are provided by convener and host, Molly Willcox, and are solicited from participants as well. A question is picked from a basket and, using a talking stick (giving everyone space to express themselves without interruption), participants explore that question for as long as the conversation holds momentum. Then another topic is picked.

Molly says, "As we hear our own voices, test our ideas and approach new thoughts and feelings, our conversation becomes a vehicle for personal insight and deeper connection to the Earth and the future we hope to create."

Talking Tree sessions last an hour and a half and are held upstairs in the Carpenter Room every other week at 12:45, right after the service.
