Minister's Column

When my life feels like it's too full or moving too fast, I try to remember that it's a primary spiritual task to pay attention: to observe and be present, as if awaiting

further instructions.

Waiting and watching doesn't always come naturally to me. If you've known me for more than five days, you know that I'm a do-er. It's my nature to take action; to make things happen; to turn the theoretical into the concrete. The problem with "doing" mode is that it can leave little room for Spirit to join us. Sometimes our constant planning and acting and thinking and charging ahead, or even coasting on autopilot, can keep us too occupied to notice Life's subtle nudge.

In any given day... or in any given week... or in any given 7-year ministry, it's not only a good idea but also necessary to move away from the doing, and into the stillness of paying attention. When I'm able to pause in this way, it's as though I'm fiddling with a radio dial, scanning through the static to hear the voice of The Great Mystery. Waiting and listening is a way of allowing the All That Is And Ever Shall Be to find me, reconnect with me, and be my chosen copilot (as opposed to me running on autopilot).

I've loved the past six-and-a-half years of serving as your minister... and that continuous service has allowed little time for pausing, for resting, for paying attention to how Spirit is moving in and through my ministry. One way to think about my three-month sabbatical: it's a window for me to shift from doing to being; to replenish my well with rest and creativity and God.

My sabbatical begins on February 22nd and lasts through May 22nd. To ensure that I'm fully "away" during my sabbatical, I will not be in contact with anyone in the Fellowship. (In keeping with UU practice, any voicemails or emails that I receive between February 22nd and May 22nd will be deleted without listening to or reading them.)

Your leadership—and especially your Sabbatical Team of Bob, Tiffany, Sandy, and Carney—have readied themselves to activate your shared ministry, so that we can each experience these three months on our own—without one another. (A UU minister will be available for situations that your leaders deem an emergency.)

NOW—this month—is the time for us to be present to one another: to have the conversations that you need to have before I leave. Let us pay attention to each other in the coming weeks, relishing each other's company before I move away from the Fellowship and toward Spirit.

Martin Luther King Day events in the Twin Villages

Once again, our partner organization, People United Against Racism, will be facilitating several Martin Luther King Day weekend events, January 19 and 20.

The events start with a special showing of the movie *Backs Against the Wall: The Howard Thurman Story*, Sunday, January 19, at 2 pm at the Lincoln Theater. There will be a post film discussion led by Andrew Fenniman, director of the theater.

The highlight of the weekend will be a community interfaith service at the Second Congregational Church in Newcastle at 6 pm the same day. Music provided by community choirs.

As always, on Monday, Martin Luther King Day itself, there will be a Day of Service event with Lincoln Academy. Gather at the Second Congregational Church's basement at 9 am to participate.

Finally, there will be a special MLK Day anti-racism vigil at 12 noon, immediately following the Day of Service, in Veterans Memorial Park, next to the Second Congregational Church. Bring your own signs, or pick one up inside the back door of the church. (Note: We have gone to special, as needed vigils—of which this is one—to replace the regular Monday vigils, which suffered from lack of participation. This is your only chance for a while to come and stand with your neighbors against all forms of racism!)





MUUSAN Network Meeting January 11th to kick-off the 2020 Maine Legislative Session

Guest speaker is Rep. Seth Berry, D-Bowdoinham who will discuss bill LD 1646 to establish a consumer-owned utility to replace Emera Maine and Central Maine Power. Dubbed the Maine Power Delivery Authority, it would function like Maine's eight existing consumer-owned utilities and fill the gaps between the existing companies.

"Looking forward, Maine faces some massive new challenges to its electrical grid, and that has a lot to do with climate change, " said Berry. "We're already seeing an increase in severe weather, which causes power outages. There needs to be an investment in the power grid to make it more reliable".

Our Whole Lives Sexuality Education for Grades K-2 at First Universalist Church in Rockland

What is OWL K-1? <u>Our Whole Lives for Grades K-1</u> is an 8-session curriculum for five to seven year old children in kindergarten and first grade. Second graders also are welcome to participate. This program is based on the philosophy that parents and educating institutions including religious communities can form a meaningful partnership for positive and responsible sexuality education. The title, <u>Our Whole Lives</u> (OWL) was chosen to convey the belief that sexuality is a lifelong process of acquiring information and forming attitudes and values about identity and relationships, intimacy and health. This is one of six programs in the *Our Whole Lives Lifespan Sexuality Education series*.

What is covered in OWL K-1?

- Our Wonderful Bodies, including accurate names for body parts
- * Healthy Bodies, Safe Bodies
- * Families
- * Families and Feelings
- * Babies and Families
- * Birth of a Baby



When is OWL happening?

Mandatory orientation for parents and children is Sunday, January 26 from 12 - 2:30 p.m. Then we will have sessions on Sunday mornings from 10:15 a.m. to 11:15 a.m. (2/2, 2/16, 3/1,3/8, 3/15, 3/29), and finish on April 5 with the final session, a luncheon and family celebration.
