October 17: Rev Abigail Stockman - "Restoring Justice"

When I entered my graduate program last spring I thought I knew what justice was; now I am not quite as certain. A large part of our Unitarian and Universalist faith is about doing justice. And times of change are opportunities to increase justice. A well-known biblical verse, Micah 6:8, asks what does the good require of us? Part of the answer is to "do justice". This service will reflect on "doing justice".

Rev. Abigail Stockman (she/her/elle) describes herself as semi-retired. She has served UU Congregations in Rhode Island, NY, Maryland, NH, and Vermont, in a variety of transitional ministries. Currently she lives in Vermont's "northeast kingdom" and once again had her socks knocked off by the magnificence of this autumn's colors. In addition to congregational work her ministries have included hospice, prison, and justice settings. Currently she attends a graduate program in Restorative Justice. Abigail is also a harpist with the Vermont Philharmonic, a community orchestra.

On Monday, October 4, 2021, the Edgecomb Select Board voted to approve MUUF's request to meet in the Edgecomb Town Hall. The building is heated, there are bathroom facilities, plenty of socially distanced seats inside, and ample space for parking your car. And it's only an 11 minute drive from downtown Damariscotta!

good people of Edgecomb for welcoming us back! Please come join us. It's a lovely place to gather.

- Picking readings, music or stories for the service
- Finding and inviting guest ministers or speakers
- Finding MUUF members to participate in a service
- Identifying and contacting other UU churches with services on Zoom

#### Coordination

- Working with guest ministers or speakers to develop the service
- Coordinating the music with Kevin and Susan
- Developing services for all ages with Carney
- Organizing resources in Google Drive that can be incorporated into services
- Working as a committee to plan out the monthly calendar of services

#### Creation

- Creating a service around a given theme using a template
- Writing an original piece for a reading, prayer, story or personal reflection
- Writing and delivering a sermon

- Creating artwork to accompany a service, or background slides for a zoom service
- Creating a service around a highly interactive format
- Writing out hymn of responsive reading words for the Order of Service

#### **Service Preparation**

- Overseeing the physical set-up for a service
- Cleaning up after a service

#### Tech

- Helping set up the technical aspects of a service
- Running the tech aspects of a service (Zoom and presentation of slides)
- Providing tech assistance to other WA folks

#### **Presentation**

- Lighting and extinguishing the Chalice
- Reading the Readings
- Reading a story or leading an activity in Time for All Ages
- Leading a group exercise or break-out session


#### **Social Justice**
